### Pastor's Message

Dear Friends,

There once was a man named Jacob who tricked his father and cheated his brother and then ran away far into the desert wilderness to escape. That night with only a stone for a pillow, Jacob had a wondrous dream of a ladder of angels ascending from earth and descending from heaven. He awoke from his dream and proclaimed "Surely God was in this place, and I did not know it."

Jacob was still in the desert when he had his dream. He was still on the run, and he was still Jacob, a name that means "Grabber." Yet even in that desert time, desert place, desert person, he could affirm surely God was still present.

I think that's the first lesson of a Desert Faith.

There once were a people named the Israelites who were slaves in a foreign land. But when God heard their cries and brought them out to freedom, God also led them into a desert wilderness where they lived for 40 years. It took that long to learn that the only way to live in the desert was to live together.

I think that's another lesson of a Desert Faith.

There once was a woman named Hagar who was exiled to a harsh and dry desert by her owners. Alone and bereft, she was preparing to die when an angel appeared and pointed her toward food and water. Sometimes unexpected angels or hidden streams can offer hope in the most fearsome of deserts.

Yet another lesson of a Desert Faith.

This February, as I shared recently, I am giving a series of presentations and engaging in conversations at Yale Divinity School on "A Desert Church for a Desert Time." It's a chance to share what we've learned from the stories of people like Jacob, Hagar, or the Israelites in the desert places and times of their lives. It's also a chance to share what lessons of faith, hope, or love we've learned from living in the high desert of northern New Mexico.

I suspect that most of the students, and faculty, have come from much greener corners of this continent. The landscape of their lives is likely one of forests and meadows, prairies and lowlands.

Yet even if they've never seen an actual desert, I imagine most of the students, and faculty, have known desert times and desert places in their lives. Their deserts may not be called Sinai or Sonoran. Instead they may have names like divorce or downsizing, layoffs or illness, but they are still desert places and desert times.

Perhaps by sharing the hope, dreams, and angels we've known as a desert church, others might find such blessings in their desert places and times, too. Perhaps, like Jacob, they and we will once again know "surely God was in this place," even if we didn't know it.

Before the Israelites leave their 40-year sojourn in the wilderness, Moses offers them his final wisdom. (Deuteronomy 30:15-20) Simply, "Choose life" or in keeping Epiphany's theme, "Choose Light!" In worship this Sunday, we welcome three United members to share how they try to make that choice in their workaday lives. Their stories can help us find our way, too.

#### Carrying the Light Mardi Gras Sunday February 19

After Peter, James, and John make it to the top of a high mountain with Jesus, the three disciples see Jesus in glorious light. Not surprisingly, they want to stay in that mountaintop glory, but God tells them to listen to Jesus, which means they need to follow

where he leads—down from the mountain to offer God's light, life, and hope to others. Guided by the Andy Kingston Trio, we'll take that journey, too. Bring a friend to our annual, toe-tapping Mardi Gras service!





#### Ash Wednesday – Feb. 22 12:00 Noon and 7:00 pm

"Create in me a clean heart," prays the composer of Psalm 51, "and renew a right spirit within me." A new heart and a steadfast spirit—a good starting point for Lent's journey. When we turn our fears and sins back to dust and come for the marking of ashes, may we join with the Psalmist—and commit our hearts and spirits to a new and right relationship with God, our neighbor, and all creation.

#### What Do We Really Want? 1st Lent – February 26

Deep in the wilderness, the Devil of Doubt entices a hungry Jesus to turn stones into bread. The Devil says to Jesus over and over: "If you are <u>really</u> the Chosen One..." To face down the Great Distractor, Jesus must remember what he really hungers for. "We do not live by bread alone," he affirms, "but by every word from the mouth of God." (Matt.4:1-11) What are *our* deep hungers? Lent begins with that question.

### Children's Ministry


#### United's Children have a "Year of Helping" Love God by Loving Neighbor and Creation! **Sunday Mornings during 10:00 Worship**

#### A "Living Endowment" Leaving a Legacy

The Revs. Mary and Shirley Greene were United Church of Christ ministers who retired to Santa Fe in the early 1980's. Mary had served small churches in Colorado. Shirley (who was named before Shirley Temple made his name a popular girl's name) was on the UCC global ministries staff. Mary created United's Children's Ministry and played for Sunday services when United couldn't afford a pianist. She co-led a nursing home ministry and volunteered with Ben and Carolyn Whitehill at the State Penitentiary. Shirley founded Santa Fe Habitat for Humanity—and got the rest of United involved, too—and started New Mexico Conference of Churches.

When Mary and Shirley passed away in the mid-1990's, they left 10% of their modest estate to United. Half their bequest helped United lease a "temporary modular unit" (aka trailer) that was our first "Nurture Center" for preschoolers and infants. The other half went into United's small endowment to become our first "Living Endowment," which generated enough interest and dividends yearly to

match what the Greene's annual pledge had been. Given that United's yearly Stewardship campaign was always a challenge, maintaining their pledge helped the fledging congregation continue to care for children, youth, and the wider community. By including the United Church in *your* will or estate planning, you can also "leave a living legacy" for those who come after.

### **United's Outreach Giving Totals \$112,114 in 2022**
