Jesus Goes up the Rough Side of the Mountain (**cong. bold**)

Luke 9:28-35

One day Jesus climbed a high mountain to pray, taking Peter, John, and James along. While he was in prayer, the appearance of his face changed and his clothes became blinding white. At once two men were there talking with him. They turned out to be Moses and Elijah! What a glorious appearance they made! . . .

United contracts with Reunity Resources to turn compostable products (food waste, meat scraps, etc.) into rich, life-giving compost. Pick up compostable garbage bags at the church (**NO** standard plastic bags, please), fill them at home, and bring back to put in the green bin by the Children's Garden. More things in compost bins means less in landfills. (Also at church, **please put coffee cups and napkins in compost cans in the Community Room.**) Thanks!

United's "Carbon Offset Program" helps plant trees and change policies to address climate change. It's simple to do: track your car mileage and/or plane flight hours and donate through United to our partners *Tree New Mexico* and *NM Interfaith Power and Light*. CALLED TO A NEW JOURNEY – LENT 2026

Each Gospel tells of Jesus' life and ministry in different ways. Our guide this Lent is the Gospel of John, composed (or compiled) toward the end of the 1st century. The Roman Empire still ruled with an iron fist, the eyewitnesses to Jesus were long dead, and the Resurrection wasn't even a distant memory. Whoever wrote John's Gospel had to make Jesus come alive solely through stories and teachings. Most all, the author had to make good on Jesus' promise of new life. Two millennia later, we face the same challenge. Let's rise to that challenge together in worship this Lent.

“Create in me a clean heart,” prays the composer of Psalm 51, and renew a right spirit within me.” A new heart and a steadfast spirit—a good starting point for Lent's journey. And the Prophet Joel reminds us that it's never too late to turn back to God's ways. (Joel 1-2, 12-17) When we turn our fears and sins back to dust and come for the marking of ashes, may we join with the Psalmist—and commit our hearts and spirits to a new and right relationship with God, God's children, and God's creation.
