Pastor's Message

Dear Friends.

Four years ago this February, a new disease called the coronavirus made its way into national, global, and local news. I doubt any of us had a clue as to how much covid would turn our lives, our church, and this world upside down. What started with recommendations to wash our hands for 20 seconds (while singing "Happy Birthday") and maybe wear a mask led to emergency hospital tents, school closures, and hundreds of thousands of deaths nationally and millions across the globe.

Perhaps like you, I had no clue as to how long "coronatime" would last, or its impact on our personal lives or our life together, as families and friends, as a nation, and as a congregation.

Two years ago, the United Church of Santa Fe was asked to be a part of a five-year nationwide study of 300 congregations focused on the long-term impact of the pandemic on their life and ministry. Sponsored by the Lilly Foundation and the Hartford Institute, the EPIC ("Exploring the Impact of the Pandemic on Congregations") program has also included a survey of 1,700 clergy of a variety of backgrounds and across denominations, from evangelical to progressive.

As we look to our own church's future, the EPIC study can help us understand our challenges and opportunities. In the 11:15 Sunday Forum on January 28, we'll share an overview of the EPIC findings. We'll also take time to reflect on our own experiences, individually and as a congregation. I hope you'll plan to join in!

To prime the pump for the Jan. 28 Forum, I invite you to take time to consider some questions:

- > As you look back to February 2020, how has your own life changed?
 - What have been the losses, due to the pandemic or otherwise?
 - What do you miss or even grieve?
 - At the same time, what new life have you experienced, either because of the pandemic or for other reasons?
 - What do you give thanks for over the last 4 years?
- ➤ What changes have you experienced in the life and ministry of United Church (or other churches, if you're new to United) in the last 4 years?
 - What has remained the same?
 - What do you miss or grieve?
 - What new life—either in terms of ministries or spirit—has United known since February 2020?
- Finally, how has the pandemic and other changes of the past four years changed your understanding of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ?

If you want to share your thoughts prior to the January 28 Forum, please write me at <u>unitedchurch.talitha@gmail.com</u>. And put both worship and the Forum on your calendar, as we begin to lay the foundation for the future to which God calls us as a church and calls each of us individually as followers of Jesus. Renewed in the Desert, Renewed in the Dark - Feb. 4

Even Jesus needed time off. The Gospel of Mark (1:29-39) says that early in his ministry, after teaching and healing people with all kinds of physical and mental afflictions, Jesus got up "while it was still very dark" and went to a deserted place to pray. (I would have gone to a spa:-) In the desert—a place seen as hostile to life—and in deep darkness, Jesus found new life and light. This Christian faith is so very odd.

Not for the Faint-Hearted Mardi Gras Sunday – Feb. 11

"Faith," said Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., "is taking the first step, even when you don't see the whole staircase." The disciples Peter, James, and John must have had that kind of "take the first step" faith when they followed Jesus up a mountain, not knowing where they were going or what they would find at the top. Along the way, they must have also realized such faith wasn't for the faint of heart. The Andy Kingston Trio leads the way in this musical morning for all ages!



Fools for Love Lent Begins on Valentine's Day

Three days after Mardi Gras Sunday, we start Lent on Valentine's Day (aka Ash Wednesday)! The music shifts to minor keys and the Sanctuary colors change to a somber purple—not rose red. It's a time of letting go, even fasting from things like chocolate. What kind of faith is this? One that leads to love that never ends and the new life of Easter.

Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday—what could they possibly have in common? Love, for one thing. Or perhaps the only real thing. "Create in me a clean heart," asked the Psalmist, "and renew a right spirit within me." (Psalm 51:10) "Return to me," God pled through the Prophet Joel, "with all your heart." (Joel 2:12) In both corrigon was turn healt.

The One Who Knew Steadfast Love First Lent – Feb. 18

Steadfast—another word for faithful. In Psalm 25, the composer uses "steadfast" three times to describe God's love. I wonder if Jesus recited the psalm—or at least the phrase "steadfast love"—to himself during his 40 days in the wilderness when it was easy to doubt such love. (Mark 1:9-15) I wonder if being rooted in the steadfast love of God is what enabled him to offer such love to others.

Jesus the carpenter's son. Jesus the Healer. The Teacher. The Singer? The gospels don't identify Jesus as a tenor or bass, but in the wilderness, he quoted psalms (aka songs) to the Tempter. He would have regularly celebrated the Sabbath with songs of thanks. And at the end of the meal on the last night of his life, he and his disciples "sang a hymn and went out into the darkness." This Sunday, we welcome Dr. Anton Armstrong, Professor of Music and Conductor of the world-renowned St. Olaf Choir, as our guest in worship (part of the FebFest24 weekend). With United's Director of Music Bradley Ellingboe, we'll share a "trialogue sermon" on the role of music in faith, and particularly African American sacred music. It promises to be a great morning!

Outreach

United's Outreach Giving Totals \$83,451in 2023

United Church members and friends, in Santa Fe and across the country, gave over \$83,000 this past year to "love God by loving our neighbor and God's creation."

Over \$13,300 went to the United Church of Christ, regionally and nationally, as well as to special offerings (One Great Hour of Sharing, Christmas Fund) and local congregations in need.

The remainder went to both local and international partners to provide support and supplies for Ukrainian refugees, Afghan resettlement, Navajo/Diné relief, regular meals for guests of Santa Fe shelters, gift cards for public schools families in need, legal aid for immigrants, comfort backpacks for kids in crisis, books and social workers for public school kids, carbon offset for climate advocacy, support for composting, Maui fire relief, hurricane and other climate catastrophe relief, and financial assistance for members and friends facing medical or other emergency needs.



In addition, United's outreach efforts are supported by extensive staff and volunteer involvement. A detailed report of outreach giving will be provided in the Feb. 18 Congregational Budget meeting.

Thank you all, near and far, who made such generosity possible! And who will continue it into the future as we are called to "Love God, Love Neighbor, Love Creation."

Compassionate Christmas Gift Market
