### Covenant of The United Church of Santa Fe

In the Lord's name we gather together here in Santa Fe

to worship and grow in the Christian tradition,

to minister in love to all persons, to strive for justice and peace, to respond to God's word.

We celebrate the heritage of Santa Fe and give ourselves to its challenges and opportunities.

We endeavor to live in harmony with all creation as stewards of the earth.

We share in the life and mission of the United Church of Christ and of Christians everywhere.

To these purposes we unite and covenant with God and one another, watchful for the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Dear Friends,

The Bulgarians and Belarussians call it "The Great Day." The Croats and Armenians say it's "Resurrection." The Hungarian and Estonian words for it mean "buying meat." In many cultures, it's some variation of Pasque (Pascua in Spanish), deriving from the Hebrew "Pescha," or Passover.

"It" is Easter—a name that only started being used in the 8<sup>th</sup> century. The English title for the day apparently derives from "Eostre," the Teutonic goddess of fertility—whose symbol was the rabbit (as in "multiply like bunnies").

But it's the Koreans, Latvians, and Lithuanians who get it right. Koreans call Easter "Resurrection Season." The Latvians and Lithuanians name it "The Great Day<u>s</u>" (no singular exists).

By any name, Easter/Pascua is a <u>season</u>. The Christian celebration of Easter isn't just one day but **50 days** of feasting and rejoicing in new life. That's 10 days <u>longer</u> than Lent's 40-day discipline of fasting and solemn songs. I think that tells us something about what our priorities as Christians should be—i.e., thanks and joy.

Yet, I know for myself as perhaps for you, I can easily forget Easter's good news, especially its promise of new beginnings and second chances. Trusting God's new life throughout Easter's 50 days can take as much intentionality as any Lenten discipline.

Sharing a commitment with others can sometimes help keep us on track. To that end, on Easter Sunday, everyone—children, youth, adults—who joins in either the 6:30 Easter Sunrise or 10:00 Celebration in the Sanctuary will receive an "Eastertide Journal." (We'll also try to get them to the intown virtual congregation.)

The pocketsize notebooks will have 50 blank pages to record at least one experience of new life each of Eastertide's 50 days. It could be as simple as a new bud on a geranium in a window or as glorious as a Santa Fe sunrise. It might be a conversation with a good friend or something new you learned that day.

Whether you write or sketch, fill a full page or just jot down a word is up to you. The Eastertide Journal is not a test, and you don't have to turn it in at the end of the 50 days :-). If you want to share your journal with others, that's fine. But first and foremost, taking time each day to record one experience of new life is a way to strengthen our own trust that God is a God of life and that God is still at work in this world.

As we've explored through Lent, I think we may need that trust even more in the time ahead.

Ten days longer than Lent, the season of Eastertide reminds us time and again of God's intention for us and all creation—new life, new hope. I hope you'll join in on Easter Sunday—and in the 50 days that follow!

## HOLY WEEK

### *Emptied* Palm Sunday March 24 (8:30 & 10:00 am)

We begin the 10:00 service as the Palm Sunday crowd, singing "Hosanna" and waving branches. But the story leads us to four nights later, when Jesus prayed alone, as his disciples slept and Judas sold him out. No ecstatic crowd, just a desperately lonely man praying, "Remove this cup, O Lord." An ancient Christian hymn describes Jesus as the one who "emptied himself." What must we empty within ourselves to take the journey that follows?

Maundy Thursday March 28 (7:00 pm)

We share Communion, followed by the story of Jesus' Passion that leads us into night's deepest shadows.

### Good Friday—March 29 Creation Care – 9:00 to 11:30 Good Friday Worship – Noon

We gather outside, as they did on the first Good Friday, to engage this hard once again, through Gospel and music. The Sanctuary will also be open until 3:00 pm for private prayer.



### EASTERTIDE WORSHIP

For Christians, Easter isn't just one day. It's a 50-day season (10 days longer than Lent). Worship continues the celebration and the challenge of the Resurrection—both Jesus' and ours.

## *Thank God for Thomas* 2<sup>nd</sup> Easter – April 7

The disciple Thomas gets a bad rap. Just because he wanted first-hand proof (literally) of Jesus' resurrection from the dead, he's labeled

"Doubting Thomas." (John 20:19-31) A more accurate name is "Truthful Thomas," as he expressed what many of us also need. United Church Council members lead both services.

### *We Had Hoped* 3<sup>rd</sup> Easter – April 14

The early Christians were an honest group, especially when it came to the

difficulty of believing in new life. "We had hoped," two disciples confessed to a stranger on the road that led away from Jerusalem. (Luke 24:13-34) Despite the women's eyewitness testimony, the two men still couldn't believe in new beginnings whether Jesus' or their own. Can you?

### *Like a Good Shepherd* 4<sup>th</sup> Easter and Earth Day – April 21

Both Jews and Christians often image God as the shepherd who cares for the sheep, even to giving up one's life for their safety and well-being.

(Psalm 23 and John 10:11-18) This Sunday before Earth Day, can we live into our call to be Good Shepherds in our care for creation?

### *Abide* 5<sup>th</sup> Easter – April 28

Jesus may have been a carpenter's son, but he apparently knew his horticulture. "I am the vine, you are the branches," he

told his followers. (John 15:1-11) "Apart from the vine, the branches cannot bear fruit," he said, "and neither can you." But surely, Jesus, you're not talking about us rugged individuals who've pulled ourselves up by our bootstraps in our own unique and independent ways. Or maybe you are.



# Music

As we head into Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter, the musical life of the church is at its peak. Palm Sunday begins with a processional reminding us of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, after which the choir sings "Lift Up Your Heads, O Ye Gates." But by the end of the service, we will have descended far into the Holy Week story, singing Agnus Dei ("Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world..."), accompanied by cello. The service ends with a haunting rendition of "Were You There?" The choir sings again on Maundy Thursday, continuing this Lent's custom of singing versions of "We adore you, O Christ" (Adoramus te, Christe). Good Friday's midday outdoor service will be graced by the singing of choral scholar Yasmeen Lookman. And the 10:00 Easter service culminates with our annual tradition of the choir and congregation singing "Hallelujah" from Handel's Messiah.

After providing so much music for this holy season, the choir gets a well-deserved rest the week after Easter. And as we head into April and Eastertide, the music will illuminate the readings of Jesus' ministry after the resurrection. A full and busy time of year!
