A nationally known conductor and arranger, Dr Shoulz uses the power of the voice, through spoken word and song, to foster community and inspire action among people of all ages and abilities. As Associate Artistic Director of *VocalEssence*, a renowned choir in Minneapolis, he conducts the Chorus and is the founding conductor of the *Singers Of This Age*, a dynamic choral arts apprenticeship for Twin Cities teens. He is also the Artistic Director of *Sing Democracy 250*, a national initiative of the *Together In Hope Project*, and the University of Minnesota's *Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Tribute Concert*. He leads the Graduate Choral Conducting program at the University of St. Thomas and is also Cantor for Worship, Music, and the Arts at Westwood Lutheran Church, where he writes liturgy, plans worship, and conducts choirs for children, youth, and adults.

We are also glad to welcome back **Bradley Ellingboe**, Artistic Director of *Coro Lux* and former Director of Music for the United Church (2015 – 2025). He was Professor of Music at the University of New Mexico for 30 years and is nationally known for his many compositions and choral leadership, as well as for developing *Coro Lux* into a premiere auditioned choir that offers a diverse repertoire ranging from Craig Hela Johnson's *Considering Matthew Shepherd* to Diné Composer Raven Chacon's *Tigue* to the upcoming concert, *Aint'a That Good News*, on Sunday, February 22, 4:00 pm at Albuquerque's African American Cultural Center.

Talitha Arnold, Pastor; Michelle Schumann, D.M.A., Music Director/Pianist; FebFest Choir (with United and *Coro Lux* members); Liturgists Tina Hubley and Larry Rasmussen; Media Coordinator Elijah Marquez with volunteer Frank Wilbanks.
