Pastor's Message

Dear Friends,

"What does it mean to be a Christian community in American 2025?"

On a beautiful Saturday morning in May, over 50 United members and friends gathered to engage in that question. Some had been part of United for decades, many were new in the last three to five years or even the last few months. So, we began by taking time in small groups to get to know one another, sharing our hopes and concerns for our country, world, and church.

We also engaged stories and teachings of Jesus that tell who he was and what he did. Parables like the "Last Judgement" (Matthew 25:31-46) that affirms Christ is found as "the least of these" or Jesus' assertion that the Spirit of the Lord was upon him to proclaim "sight to the blind and release to the captives" (Luke 4), which also challenged us—individually and as a church—to figure out what it means to follow Jesus in our time.

The May retreat was only the beginning of this new stage of United's journey. We'll continue the conversation in a variety of settings over the coming weeks and months. At the same time, we will try—as individuals and as a church—to live more deeply into the love, justice, and compassion to which our faith calls us.

Although the May retreat didn't prescribe specific actions, the impetus for the gathering came from the Lenten course, offered by Larry Rasmussen, on the witness and actions of Dietrich Bonhoeffer in Nazi Germany. A theologian and pastor by training, Bonhoeffer not only wrote about resisting the rise of fascism, anti-Semitism, and violence in his country. He and his community also took actions to counter it. He also redefined the Christian (and especially Lutheran) understanding of God's grace—differentiating between "cheap grace" and costly grace.

"Cheap grace is grace without discipleship," he wrote, "grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, living and incarnate." For Bonhoeffer, true grace meant costly commitment and sacrifice, risking the world's disapproval and putting one's life on the line.

True grace, Bonhoeffer affirmed, "is costly because it costs a [person their] life, and it is grace because it gives [them] the only true life."

To be a Christian, to be true to the God of all life and all love, in America 2025 demands our trust in God's costly grace. But that trust is not simply a matter of individual will. The ability to commit to a life of costly grace comes from our commitment to life together. Discipleship is not a solitary endeavor. We need one another's prayers and songs to face the struggles and disappointments. We need each other's encouragement to resist despair and to nourish the compassion and courage that life in America 2025 demands.

Thanks be to God for that costly, and true, grace. And thanks be to God for a community like United that gives us the courage and compassion to live into such grace, in this time and all times.

Who's in Your Circle? 7th Easter – June 1

A wealthy widow, an enslaved girl, and a guard at the NM Penitentiary. All of them were part of the first Christian community in Philippi—okay, so the guard was at the Macedonian pen. (Acts 6:16-34) Their story challenges us to consider not only who's welcome at United—but whom do we actually reach out to and invite? And whom do we meet where they are—in their places of work and neighborhoods?

A Most Inclusive Spirit Pentecost Sunday – June 8

In the traditional story of the first Pentecost from the Acts of the Apostles, God's Spirit appears as a mighty wind and tongues of fire. (Acts 2) But God's Spirit is manifest throughout the Bible: the Spirit that is with us wherever we go (Psalm 139); the cleansing waters of Baptism (be it Jesus' or the Ethiopian Eunuch's); the descending of the dove over those waters. No matter what form the Spirit takes, it always brings new life and new understanding of God's community.

A Little Lower than Angels Father's Day Sunday – June 15 "Who are we," Psalm 8 asks, "that God should

care for us?" Yet, the Psalmist continues, God has made us "a little lower than angels and crowned us with glory and honor." Quite an image, yes? It means you're pretty special, yes?

But it also means everyone else is pretty special, too—even if they don't look like us, think like us, act like us. All beloved children of a loving God.

A great passage for the secular holiday of Father's Day, and a great one for a day that we celebrate two baptisms: Sasha

Smucker and Jack Smucker.

When the prophet Elijah fled to the wilderness, his head was filled with the sounds of war, chaos, and death threats. Yet he still couldn't escape the tumult. Hiding in a cave, waiting for some word from God, the prophet was beset by the howl of the wind, then the crash of an earthquake, and finally the roar of a fire. Yet God's voice was in none of that. It came only in "the sound of sheer silence." (I Kings 19:1-9, 11-13) In our tumultuous time, how can we hear God's still, small voice?

Show Us the Path of Life June 29

"You show us the path of life," proclaims the Psalmist, "and in your presence is the fullness of joy." A great passage for Pride Sunday—because being in God's presence means being in the presence of God's people, <u>all</u> God's people. (Psalm 16)

Uniting Children and Youth In Belief, Belonging and Behavior

Recently I read a New York Times article titled "Americans Haven't Found a Satisfying Alternative to Religion." Writer Lauren Jackson observes that, while 40 million Americans have left churches, attempting to replace them with other communities, many still yearn for what sociologists call "belief, belonging, and behavior" that faith communities provide. Research shows that, for now, the mass exodus from churches seems to have plateaued.

My first Sundays at United Church have confirmed what I have been fortunate to know my entire life—namely, being a part of a community that walks together in faith and has thought-provoking discussions about what it means to be a Christian in these uncertain times is important, regardless of age or socioeconomic status.

We are stronger together! This is an overarching theme that we'll engage with United's children and youth in upcoming sessions.



Children's Ministry this summer focuses on Jesus' parables, with different stories and activities each Sunday. We'll also continue to tend to our garden and draw parallels from the Parable of the Sower. Just as plants need all the right conditions to grow, we need the right foundation to grow in faith.

For our **Middle School and High School youth**, we're bringing back the Youth Initiation program, perhaps slightly differently than in the past.

Two Who Made a Difference


In late April, United Church received an unexpected gift from the estate of Dilys Evans and Sheila Paterson who were active members since the early 2000's until health issues kept them from coming. Sheila served on the Church Council. Dilys, a renowned children's book publisher, was active with children and youth.

They were married twice at the United Church – once "illegally" in 2005 and then again in 2014 after New Mexico allowed same-gender marriages.

Sheila died several years ago, and Dilys passed away last August. We had no idea the church was in their will, but it was. Their bequest has made a difference in the current financial uncertainty and ensures United will continue to invest in family, children's and youth ministry.
