Lighting the Advent Candle of Joy

Why is today different from all other days?

Today is the Joyous Sunday of Advent, when we light the third candle on the Advent Wreath. Why is this candle different from the other candles?

The pink candle reminds us of the Rose that blooms in the midst of winter. When the people of Israel were in exile, Isaiah promised that the desert would rejoice and blossom. Even in the most barren of times, God still brings joy and loveliness.

What does the third candle mean?

It is the Candle of Joy and reminds us of God's promise: "Sorrow and sighing shall flee away, and we shall have everlasting joy and gladness."

As we light the third Advent Candle, let us remember this promise of our faith.


Crocus in the Desert, A Rose in Winter
