Pastor's Message

The steadfast love of the Lord endures forever. (I Chronicles 16:34)

The steadfast love of the Lord endures forever. (Psalm 100:5)

The steadfast love of the Lord endures forever (Psalm 118:1-4, 29)

The steadfast love of the Lord endures forever. (Psalm 136, all 26 verses)

Dear Friends,

The steadfast love of the Lord endures forever. That sentence is repeated over thirty times in the Bible. Some variation of it appears another 30+times. The promise of God's love enduring forever is affirmed more often than any other line of scripture. (Running a somewhat distant second is "Fear not.")

A seminary professor often reminded our class that when the Bible regularly affirms a promise, chances are good that trusting that promise has become problematic. Hence, the need for repetition. Not surprisingly, trusting that the steadfast love of the Lord was often a challenge for the Biblical writers. Spanning at least 2,000 years, the Biblical texts were written in times of war, famine, pestilence, drought, political uncertainty, exile, changes in leadership (both religious and national), imperial domination (whether the empire was Babylonian or Roman), persecution, etc., etc., etc.

Moreover, whether Psalm, Gospel, or Epistle, the listeners or readers might well have been going through personal hardship—the death of a loved one, the loss of a job, an illness, the ending of a relationship, a move, or some other kind of change over which they had no control—and which made it hard to trust that "the steadfast love of the Lord endures forever."

No wonder the Bible kept repeating that promise over and over again.

I think we need to repeat it as well. At least I do. Given the national rollercoaster we've been on since January, I need to remind myself time and again that the steadfast love of the Lord endures forever, even as so much of what I thought our country stood for is dismantled, the social safety net shredded, and we are seemingly powerless as immigrants and citizens alike are kidnapped by masked, unidentified men. I need to remember that God's steadfast love is at the center of our lives and our life together. Perhaps you need to remember that, too—because that's where we will find the courage and strength to do what we must do in this time.

The steadfast love of the Lord endures forever. We also need to trust that promise in our life together as a church. In this time when a number of people are moving away from Santa Fe, and especially as we bid Godspeed and thanks to Director of Music Brad Ellingboe, may "the steadfast love of the Lord endures forever" be the Word that sustains us through such change.

Truth is, that steadfast love has been at the heart of United's life and ministry for the past 45 years. It's empowered us to weather hard times and rejoice in the good times. God's steadfast love is the foundation upon which this church was built, generation after generation. And it's the promise that will endure for generations to come.

The steadfast love of the Lord endures forever. Let's trust that truth together.

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Worship in August

Who Do We See When We See Jesus Christ?

"Long ago," begins the Letter to the Hebrews, "God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets." But in these last days, the author continues, "God has spoken to us by the Chosen One," the Christ.

So what does this Christ say to us about God? That's our focus for worship this month. We often know what we don't want to say about Jesus Christ (and often think it's easier not to say anything). But as a United Church of Christ, we need to know what we do say about Christ. As we look to a new year of life and ministry together, let's take time this month to engage that question. The anonymous author of the Letter to Hebrews, written to early Christians in a time not unlike our own, can be a good guide.

Throughout the month, we'll use both the *New Revised Standard* translation of the Bible and also the *First Nations Version*, an Indigenous translation of Christian Scripture.

The Promise of a New Covenant August 3

We don't know who wrote the "Letter to the Hebrews," when it was written or to whom it was addressed (definitely not "Hebrews" or other Jewish audiences). Evidence points to 2nd or 3rd generation Christians, struggling to keep the faith at the end of the 1st century. Rome still ruled, the Second Coming hadn't come. Had God abandoned them? Not at all, the author affirms. Instead God had created a new way of connecting with God's love and life through the life and love of Jesus Christ—a new covenant written on their hearts. (Heb. 1:1-3, 8:8-12)



The Promise of Accessible Holiness – August 10

Who is this Holy One? And how can we trust this unseen God with our lives? In this Letter, the Holy One is not some distant deity who doesn't know human life. Instead, this One can sympathize with our weakness and suffering, This One has known life as we know it, with all its joys and sorrows. Therefore, the author pleads, "let us with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need." (Heb. 4:14-16) Yes, we can trust God's promise of Christ's "accessible holiness."



The Promise of Things Hoped For August 17 (Indian Market Sunday)

Writing to people in a time of oppression and fear, the anonymous author affirmed, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Or, as the *First Nations* version of Christian scripture translates, "Trusting Creator is the solid ground our hope rests on. It means we can be sure of the things we do not yet see." (Heb. 11:1-3) Like the first Christians or the First Nations peoples, we may not see the way ahead in our time. Can we keep their faith that the Holy One is with us on our journey?

The Promise of Strength for the Journey – August 24

"We are surrounded by a great cloud of truth tellers," wrote the anonymous author (*First Nations* trans.) "who have shown us what it means to trust the Great Spirit. So let us lay to the side everything that weighs us down and the broken ways that so easily wrap around our legs to trip us." (Heb. 12:1-2) Who are our truth tellers? What weighs us down? And how do we keep going in this journey of life, hope, and faith?

The Work We're Called to Do Labor Day Sunday – August 31

"Keep loving each other as brothers and sisters of the sacred family. Do not forget to be kind and welcoming to strangers.... Keep the ones in prison in your thoughts as if you were there with them, and those who are mistreated as if you in your own body shared their suffering." (Heb. 13:1-3, *First Nations*) A good message for the Sunday before Labor Day, followed by a good promise for any day: "For the Great Spirit has said, 'I will never leave you or give up on you." (Heb. 13:6)

United's Shelter Supper Ministries Offer Food and Care


